Patrick Tayluer: The Man Behind the Sea Shanties

Longtime FSSGB member Thomas Stern asked us to share this blog entry from the Library of Congress with you.

"These should rank with the best shanty and sea-song recordings ever made." So said the sea shanty expert William Main Doerflinger in May, 1942, describing the recordings he had recently made of the retired sailor Patrick Tayluer. Circumstances have conspired to keep those recordings under wraps, until this blog series. In this post, we'll hear one of his shanties ("Paddy Lay Back" or "Mainsail Haul") and one of his sea stories. Then, we'll use available evidence to create a new biography of Patrick Tayluer (1856-1948), a multifaceted sailor, soldier, singer, storyteller, model-builder, long-distance walker, and, of course, shantyman.

"Quite simply acoustic music at it's finest," says Dirty Linen Review.

Lorraine, renowned master of the Appalachian dulcimer, also plays banjo, mandolin and Celtic harp and is an expressive singer and songwriter. Bennett, a superb finger-style guitarist and recent convert to the five string banjo, names "the three Bs", Bach, the blues and Buddy Holly, as major influences.

Together, The Hammonds are versatile musicians and engaging entertainers. Their warm stage presence is punctuated with wry humor, and their command of their instruments and musical genres is without flaw. The Boston Globe calls them "a dazzling, witty, eclectic, delightful duo." The duo's repertoire ranges in style from classical through Celtic, blues and contemporary. They sing both traditional and original songs and can be heard on over thirty recordings as featured artists, or enhancing the work of performers including Archie Fisher, Lui Collins and Bob Franke. Christine Lavin and Heidi Mueller are among the artists who have covered Hammond originals.

The couple live in Brookline, Massachusetts and their most recent releases, all on the independent folk label Snowy Egret Music are Jingalo Gypsy featuring the duo, Bennett's Rockafolky Banjo Tapes and Lorraine's Muddy River Suite.

"Singing for Justice"

Learn about the musical and political history of Faith Petric and the role of folk music in progressive politics in 20th and 21st-century America. Faith Petric (1915-2013) proudly called herself a radical, and she chose folk music as her vehicle for creating a more just world.

A student peace activist in her 20s, she continued to protest war as a Raging Granny in her 80s. She aided migrant workers in California during the Great Depression, built Liberty Ships during World War II, faced Cold War-era FBI surveillance, and marched for racial justice in Selma, AL. A single working mother, Faith retired in 1970 at age 55 and reinvented herself as a traveling folk singer, performing nationally and internationally into her 90s.

Singing for Justice is produced and directed by award-winning Stanford historian Estelle Freedman and award -winning documentary filmmaker Christie Herring. Singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist John McCutcheon is the Composer and Musical Supervisor.

Hyacinth for the Soul Singing with JourneySongs -- a Hospice Choir

Singing with a hospice choir was a long time coming for me. In the 90s I'd heard about singing at the bedside of people in hospice care, but I had to wait until after the pandemic to audition and attend a JourneySongs rehearsal. The audition with the Music Director was primarily to be sure I could match a note with my voice and sing a simple melody line. Little did I know that many of the songs of my lifetime would emerge in our repertoire.

At Pinewoods Folk Music Camp, Helen Schneyer had invited us outside on a Sunday morning for a memorable full-voice circle of "Amazing Grace," as only Helen could do. John Krumm's poignant round "Onawa's Waltz" was another final night's song at Pinewoods. An early favorite from Girl Scout camp was "Peace I Ask of Thee, Oh River," and in 1974 I'd sung it around a lunch table in the Soviet Union. These songs and many more are woven into my heart and memory.

In early September, I sang for the first time at the bedside of people in a hospice residence. A small group of us from JourneySongs chose 2-3 songs to sing to the residents in their rooms with family members and/or caregivers. The staff gave some details: a specific faith; any relationship with singing or music; where they were in transition from life to death. We sang "Ose Shalom" to a Jewish resident, the round "Dona Nobis Pacem" in two parts, and concluded several room visits with "Amazing Grace."

Singing with JourneySongs is indeed a blossoming of a new Hyacinth for My Soul!
